## Upcoming National Events:

March 2 - Texas Independence Day: morning Houston, afternoon Washington on the Brazos March 6 - Dawn commemorating Fall of the Alamo

Speaker: Our speaker was Christie Erickson who grew up in a military family. Christie traveled and went to school in several different states and countries all over the world, including Greece, Germany, Okinawa, and twelve states. She was employed with Clear Creek ISD as the District Internal Auditor for 12 years and now owns her own consulting business, Yellow Rose Tax & Financial Services, LLC. She is a member of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Speakers Committee, a member of Western Heritages' History Live and an honorary member of the Sons of the Republic of Texas, Sidney Sherman Chapter. Christie presented her rendition of the life of Emily West Morgan, aka "Yellow Rose of Texas" (b.1815), who was a folk heroine whose legendary activities during the Texas Revolution have come to be identified with the song "The Yellow Rose of Texas". Morgan was a free woman of color, or a "high yellow" as was used in those times, born in New Haven, Connecticut. In 1835 she was contracted to Captain James Morgan in New York to work as an indentured servant for one year in Morgan's Point, Texas, and at the New Washington Association's hotel as a housekeeper as repayment for her relocation to Texas. On April 16, 1836, West and other residents of the hotel were kidnapped by General Antonio López de Santa Anna's Mexican cavalry, during their march to face the army led by Sam Houston. The captives were in the Mexican camp on April 21 when Houston's force attacked during the Battle of San Jacinto. According to accounts from members of Houston's army, Morgan was instrumental in detaining Santa Anna during the battle which ultimately led to his capture. Christie performed a "walk-around" posing in her bright yellow period gown for the chapter. After the walk-around, we discussed the history and Christie demonstrated the art of a number of accessories, such as her parasol, muff and fan. In addition to the material on Emily West Christie discussed the mystery surrounding the song "Yellow Rose of Texas" sharing a popular version and one found I the library at the University of Texas.

Steve adjourned the meeting just after 8 PM. with a group photo taken after the meeting.
