PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

When news of the Battle at San Jacinto reached Galveston, the men there, the Texas government, those who had declared Independence for Texas at Washington on the Brazos and formed a new government were anxiously waiting. They too had been fleeing the approach of Santa Anna. President Burnet and the Texas government boarded the Yellowstone and went to the Battleground to celebrate with General Houston and the Texian Army.

General Houston who was badly wounded from a mini ball in the left ankle had negotiated a ceasefire with Santa Anna. This would later be formalized in the Treaty (and Secret Treaty) of Velasco signed on May 14, 1836.

THE DAY AFTER THE BATTLE

The sun was sinking in the horizon as the battle commenced but at the close of the conflict, the sun of liberty and independence rose in Texas, never it is hoped to be obscured by the clouds of despotism.

We have read of the deeds of chivalry and perused with ardor the annals of war; we have contemplated with the highest emotions of sublimity, the loud roaring thunder, the desolating tornado, and the withering simoon of the desert but neither of these nor all inspired us with emotions like those on this occasion.

There was a general cry which pervaded the ranks. REMEMBER THE ALAMO, REMEMBER La BAHIA! These words electrified all. Onward was the cry. The unerring aim and irresistible force of the Texan army could not be withstood.

It was freeman fighting against the minions of tyranny and the result proved the inequality of such a contest.

Immediately after the battle, General Houston sent a letter to the people of Texas,

"By the Blessing of God, the war is over, Return home, rebuild your Houses and fences, plant your corn, be free, prosper and happy"

Once word reached the people who had been fleeing East, they began their Westward trek back. As more news of the battle emerged, the families knew that few men had been lost, so most knew that they would see their husbands, sons, fathers and brothers again. As the people traveled back to their homes and land, they went with hope. The rains had lessened, the roads were less muddy and the weather was warmer. They planned to rebuild and make a new life for their families and descendants in this raw, rough frontier. They pledged to prosper in this fertile land of opportunity.


As we remember our ancestors and their struggles and sacrifices during the time of the Texas Revolution it is imperative that we follow our mission to


Sidney Sherman Chapter Meeting May 16, 2023







A Texas Honor Day Treaty of Velasco

Treaty of Velasco

- After San Jacinto, Santa Anna was forced to sign the Treaty of Velasco. This treaty ended the Texas Revolution and gave Texas its independence.
- It had two parts, one public and one secret:



Santa Anna




Public and Secret

The public part of the treaty made Santa Anna agree to never fight against Texas again and to withdraw all troops out of Texas.

The secret part of the treaty made Santa Anna promise to get Mexico to recognize Texas independence and set the southern border of Texas as the Rio Grande.
