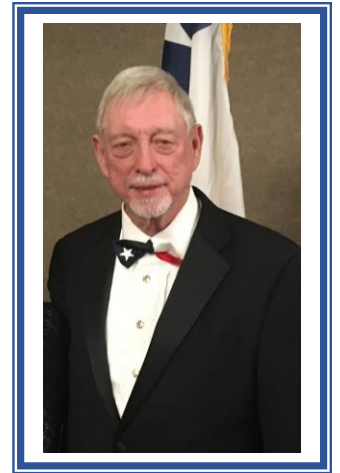

SIDNEY SHERMAN CHAPTER, NO. 2 – GALVESTON COUNTY, TEXAS

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

March 1836 – It is a dark, dark time for Texas. The Alamo has fallen. And at other battles at Refugio, San Patricio and Agua Dolce Creek, the Texian Army has been defeated. Over 600 men have been killed in the struggle for Liberty and Independence. Most denied a Christian burial.

General Sam Houston arrives in Gonzales on March 11th and learns about the Fall of the Alamo from Susana Dickinson who had been sent by Santa Anna to spread the news of the Alamo. Houston sends orders to Fannin to abandon La Bahia and to join him. General Houston sends this report on March 15th, to **James Collinsworth, Chairman of the Military Committee:**



"Since I had the honor to address you from Gonzales, the lady of Lieutenant Dickenson, who fell at the Alamo, has arrived and confirms the fall of that place, and the circumstances, pretty much as my express detailed them. She returned in company with two negroes – one the servant of Colonel Travis, the other a servant of Colonel Almonte. They both corroborate the statement first made and forwarded to you. Other important intelligence arrived at Gonzales – that the army of Santa Anna had encamped at the Cibolo on the night of the 11th inst., after a march of twenty-four miles that day. The army was to encamp on the 12th at Sandy, and proceed direct to Gonzales. The number of the enemy could not be ascertained, but was represented as exceeding two thousand infantry. Upon this statement of facts, I deemed it proper to fall back and take post on the Colorado, near Burnham's which is fifteen miles distant from this point. My morning report, on my arrival in camp, showed three hundred and seventy-four effective men, without two days' provisions, many without arms, and others without any ammunition. We could have met the enemy, and avenged some of the wrongs; but, detached as we were, without supplies for the men in camp, of either provisions, ammunitions, or artillery, and remote from the succor, it would have been madness to hazard a contest. I had been in camp two days only, and had succeeded in organizing the troops. But they had not been taught the first principles of the drill. If starved out, and the camp once broken up, there was no hope for the future. By falling back, Texas can rally, and defeat any force that can come against her..."

It was my honor and privilege to lay our Memorial Wreath along with Robert Schnuriger for the Dawn at Alamo Ceremony. We also had several Sidney Sherman Chapter members participate in the Alamo events.

I know this month's newsletter is a bit long but with 3 Texas Honor Days and the SRT Convention it makes for a lengthy newsletter, especially because so many of you participate in these important Texas History events. Our Chapter's Scrapbook took first place in its category at the SRT State Convention. I want to personally thank each of you for all your participation in our Chapter meetings and Chapter events that promote Texas History. It made for a great Scrapbook and we received many compliments at Convention.

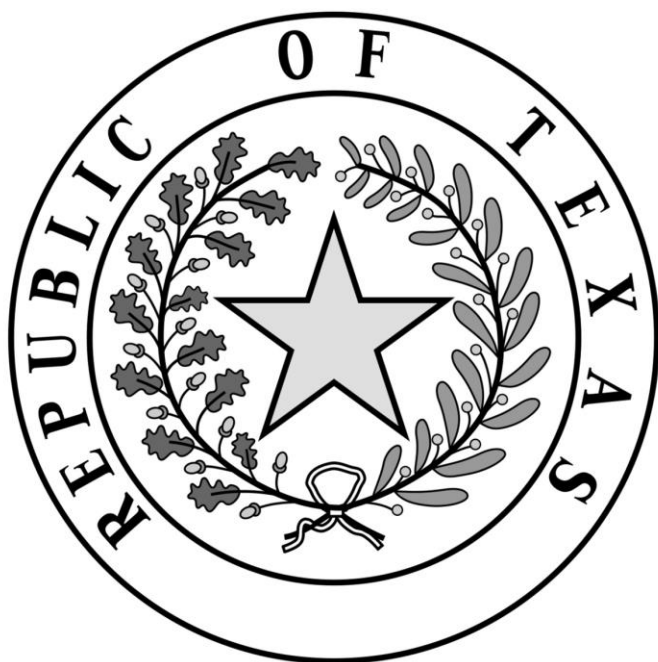

FEBRUARY MEETING

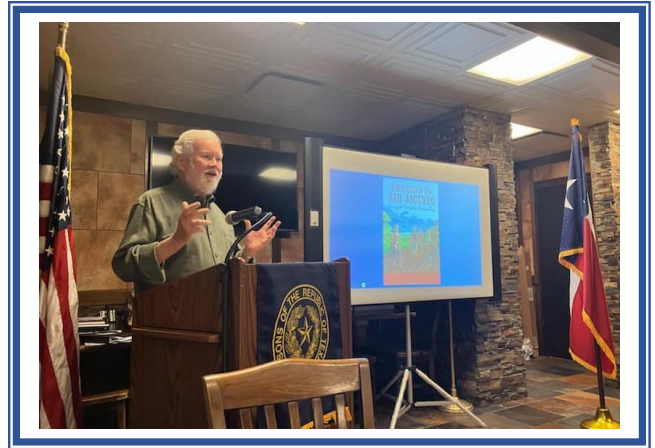
The February meeting began with President Hill announcing that one of our members, Gene Wueste, had passed away in October. Two new members, Jess Colwell and Cody Rainey were sworn into the SRT. President Hill then announced that Jess had agreed to be our new Treasurer to replace Billy Mayo who has served for seven years. Ron Schoolcraft moved to nominate Jess Colwell for the position of Treasurer and Robert Gindratt seconded the motion. The motion passed by acclamation and Jess Colwell is now our Treasurer. President Hill proceeded to install Jess to that position.

Steve Nicol announced that two (2) applications had been forwarded to the SRT and several more are in the works. The project to clean one of the monuments has reached a favorable conclusion in that another group had cleaned it. President Hill reported that the chapter had an excellent turnout for the Lamar Day Ceremony. President Hill served as color guard, and Robert Schnuriger provided the benediction for the ceremony. Seven (7) of our members attended the Anson Jones Ceremony. The next two (2) months will be busy, beginning with 3 activities on Texas Independence Day (March 2). First, the San Jacinto Chapter will gather at the Sam Houston Statute in Houston in the morning.

Some of our member expect to attend and then proceed to Washington on the Brazos for the ceremony in the afternoon. Third, the Sidney Sherman Chapter Number 1, of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas (DRT) will be meeting at Fisherman's Wharf in Galveston beginning at 11 in the morning. On March 5-6 some of our members will attend Dawn at the Alamo in San Antonio. The chapter will sponsor a wreath presentation during the ceremonies. Next, the Annual Meeting of the SRT will be held in Granbury outside of Fort Worth on March 8 – 10.

Dave Dyer provided the chapter with a review of his book *"The Road to San Jacinto: Retracing the Route of Sam Houston's Army"*. He researched the 42 campsites that Houston used marching from Gonzales to San Jacinto. He gave the members a flavor of his book by talking in detail about four (4) sites. The first was a site east of Columbus, opposite to Santa Anna camped south of the town. Houston was at this location for only a day, whereas he spent several days at the site near San Felipe. Dave discussed Vince's Bridge in detail, and is convinced that the bridge was chopped, rather than burned, because of the conditions. It was a messy wet spring in east Texas, and Houston used that to his advantage.

March Meeting

Nancy E. Potter, Bestselling author of "Barbours Cut", was born in New Orleans, Louisiana. At the age of nine, she moved with her family to Europe. While spending five wonderful years abroad, Potter learned French and gained an appreciation for people from very different cultures.

After graduating from college, Potter moved to Washington, D.C. to work on Capitol Hill and at the White House in the Office of Communications where she helped formulate ways to explain to the American public the intricacies of a new expansive project. Her entrepreneurial mindset led her to try her hand in several areas before settling into the garment industry, where she designed fashionable maternity clothes in a market with few choices.

One of Potter's sons was born with a rare genetic skin disease called Epidermolysis Bullosa (often referred to as E.B.). Out of her son's many years of pain, she learned to marvel at the little thing he could accomplish and gained great compassion for those with special needs and their caregivers. Her son is now 30 and doing well. To raise awareness and funds for much-needed research, she put on the first-ever major fundraisers for E.B. in the 1990s, and continues to work to bring awareness to the disease.

Potter now lives with her other son in Houston, Texas.

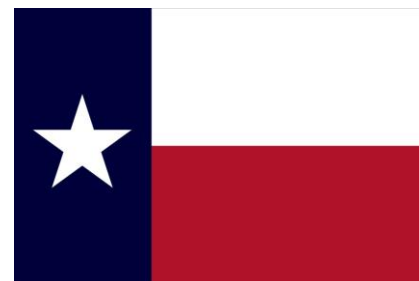

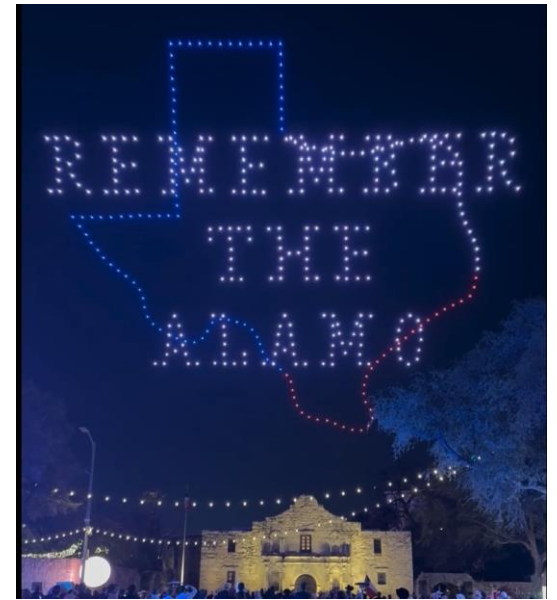
